




What are the biggest challenges where you live? Drag and drop in order from most significant to least significant. - #1 biggest challenge




What are the biggest challenges where you live? Drag and drop in order from most significant to least significant. - #2 biggest challenge











Q61 - What is your race/ethnicity? (select all that apply)




Q62 - Thinking about where you live now, do you own or rent the property?


